Volunteer Spotlight

Jerry Goerz, a retired electrical engineer and president of the Bluegrass Railroad Club, sat in a well-camouflaged room near the model train track at the Kentucky Children's Garden (KCG), talking over the sounds of fans and recorded locomotive sounds. Several years ago, the staff was having trouble keeping the trains running smoothly, he said. The club investigated and found that the problem was a buildup of dirt that impeded the flow of electricity from the tracks to the locomotive. A club member built a track-cleaning car. Goerz learned how to clean the wheels. The problem was fixed.

His story was interrupted by a signal that there had been a derailment. He hurried out into the sunlight, to a spot where children and adults were looking worriedly at several foot-long cars that had fallen off the track. Goerz righted them. The train scooted down the track, and there were smiles all around. "Sometimes there will be 15 kids all jumping up and running back and forth," Goerz said. "This job doesn't pay anything, but it's the best job ever."

Goerz is one of some 30 volunteers who help ensure that things run smoothly at the KCG, a two-acre garden at the 100-acre Arboretum designed to educate and delight children between the ages of two and 10 and their families. Dawn Bailey, The Arboretum's Education Coordinator, said most of the volunteers are

retirees. But this year, one is a college student. There's also a bright nine-year-old who isn't an official volunteer but shows great enthusiasm overseeing activities involving younger children.

Volunteers are often the first people KCG visitors encounter when they enter the gates. Their jobs as greeters include letting visitors know what educational programming is happening that day, making sure no one gets in who hasn't paid admission, and enforcing the "service animals only" rule. There also are volunteers who work at field trips and special events, doing things such as teaching children basics about plants, butterflies, macroinvertebrates and other environmental lessons.


On an already warm morning earlier this season, three people were at work weeding and glistening with perspiration long before children arrived.

- **Nancy McNally**, who has been volunteering since The Arboretum's earliest days, is described as a "go-to" person who can make pioneer dolls for the log cabin, sew donated T-shirts into reusable bags, and even help build a wigwam with grasses grown at The Arboretum. "It's really fun," she said. "And who has ever built a wigwam?"
- **Liz Reucroft** is a Fayette County Extension Master Gardener. During frog-mating season, she might be found near the KCG pond, explaining that tadpoles turn into frogs and what frogs eat. "I love being around children," she said. "They are such eager listeners and learners with all the things we can show them here."
- **Gail Lam**, also a Master Gardener, serves as a greeter and helps with field trips. She admits she is one of those rare people who really enjoys pulling weeds. "It's very satisfying," she said. "It makes me sleep good at night." Lam also said she loves volunteering because it gives her an opportunity to spend time with her granddaughter Evelyn, the nine-year-old mentioned earlier. Evelyn does many things, including refereeing a tug-of-war or talking about cacti and explaining that the prickly pear is Kentucky's only native cactus. "She does an amazing job," said Bailey,

the Education Coordinator. "I think the kids listen to her more because she's a kid."

If you are interested in being a KCG volunteer in 2023, be on the lookout for announcements of training sessions for new and returning volunteers to be held next spring. Potential volunteers have to pass a background check and be willing to commit for a full season.

Volunteers help make possible everything you see and experience while at The Arboretum, State Botanical Garden of Kentucky and the Kentucky Children's Garden. Starting with this issue of the newsletter, we will tell you about each of our four primary volunteer areas--the Kentucky Children's Garden, the Walk Across Kentucky (WAKY) Native Plants Collection, the Horticultural Gardens, and the Demonstration Vegetable Garden. Future newsletters will also tell you more about how to become a volunteer.

We will also offer \$5 off the price of \$100 if you were a previous seasonal member and bring your card with you to purchase your 2023 KCG membership--and you can receive one or both discounts!



Arboretum Advisory Board Spotlight

Starting Small: A Career of Service and Giving Back

As a UK professor of landscape architecture, Ned Crankshaw has always appreciated the education, conservation, and research mission of The Arboretum, State Botanical Garden of Kentucky. But when he committed himself to running more in the spring of 2006, he gained new appreciation for the 100-acre public garden's role and function in the Lexington community.

When Ned arrived at UK in 1990, The Arboretum was just an idea. The Departments of Landscape Architecture and Horticulture were conceptualizing plans for a new public garden on UK's campus and working with a landscape architecture firm to create a master plan. The University began by planting trees, and the City contributed by building the loop trail through what would become the Walk Across Kentucky Native Plant Collection.

Though Ned's service to The Arboretum wouldn't come for another few years, he started doing student design projects there, erecting large, temporary structures. He appreciated that visitors could experience the great work that students were doing in the department in a visible location.

In the late 90's, Ned began volunteering at The Arboretum, helping especially with design work on the Kentucky Children's Garden. Then, in 2010, when he became Landscape Architecture Department Chair, he joined The Arboretum's Advisory Board. "I got a fuller sense of what it took to operate The Arboretum, financially and logistically," says Ned.

Over the years, Ned learned more about the ways people interact with The Arboretum. "Some people visit The Arboretum specifically to learn more about plants," says Ned. "For example, a wonderful place to learn about native plants

of Kentucky is in the Walk Across Kentucky, which represents plants and landscapes from the seven physiographic regions of Kentucky. And many people go for the aesthetic experience. It's a beautiful place. It doesn't matter that people don't know what species everything is, they are still getting a strong dose of nature out there."

While overt education is frequently the goal of visitors—The Arboretum staff conduct workshops and tours and many UK classes meet there and conduct scientific investigation—Ned believes that by using The Arboretum in a passive recreational manner, folks are advocating for the importance of nature in urban spaces. "They are valuing the natural environment," says Ned. "Where else can you have such a healthful place in Lexington, free of the dangers of cars?"

Since becoming a grandfather, Ned (*pictured below with his granddaughter*) and his wife Vickie have enjoyed bringing their granddaughter to the Kentucky Children's Garden, a two-acre garden designed to share the joy and wonder of nature and plants. It's a place where children can interact with natural materials and use their imaginations.



Recently, Ned finished his second 6-year term as chair of UK's Landscape Architecture Department and began his transition to the role of Acting Dean of the College of Design.

In 2014, Ned became UK's co-chair of The Arboretum Advisory Board. He will step off the board in December 2022 and he will be greatly missed. As lifelong supporters of environmental organizations, Ned and Vickie had always donated to places and programs that they believed bettered the world around them. He began donating to The Arboretum through UK's monthly payroll deduction program, which is available to all UK faculty and staff. "I was up there a lot, giving a lot of time," says Ned. "We decided to start giving a monthly amount that, over the course of a year, would add up to a sizeable donation. As a UK employee, the payroll deduction plan makes it easy to make a donation with each paycheck."

Through his many years of service to The Arboretum, Ned understood the needs of The Arboretum and had seen firsthand the power of the work that

happens there. It made giving back an easy decision. “The Arboretum is a place I genuinely love,” says Ned. “Why wouldn’t I want to support it?” Having been at UK for over 30 years, Ned realizes that he could have started supporting on-campus programs and units much sooner in his career. He encourages folks to start with regular and pain-free donations, however small.

“Don’t wait to be the big hero,” says Ned. “Do something small, but meaningful, now.”
